He is an economist by training and has spent the last 30 years analysing telecommunications regulation and market developments.

Philippe started his telecommunications career as a researcher at the University of Namur in the 1980s. Between 1991 and 1994, he worked for the European Commission, where he was mainly involved in the legislative process that led to the adoption of the ONP Leased Lines Directive.



Thierry Breton
EU Commissioner
for Internal Market

Thierry Breton began his career as a professor of IT and Mathematics at the Lycée Français de New York and was the CEO of Forma Systems. In 1986, Breton started his political career as an adviser to the French Ministry of Education and Research, where he designed the open-air science and technology theme park Futuroscope. He also sat on the Poitou-Charentes Regional Council from 1986 to 1992 and served as its vice-president from 1988.

After six years of working in the public sector, Breton returned to the industry as the Director for Strategy and Development at Bull. The French government also appointed him as CEO of Thomson Multimedia (1997-2002) and France Telecom (2002-2005). Breton returned to politics as the Minister for the Economy, Finance and Industry in 2005. He then spent a year as a professor of leadership and corporate accountability at Harvard University in 2008, before becoming the CEO of Atos.


In 2019, he took on the role of the EU Commissioner for Internal market in Ursula von der Layen's cabinet. Breton is in charge of the Internal Market portfolio, which includes the digital economy and digital transition, functioning of the single market, Europe's industrial future and a European strategy for the data economy. Thierry Breton holds a master's degree in electrical engineering and computer science from SUPELEC and is a graduate of the French Institute for Higher National Defence.

He became an assistant adviser at the Ministry of Justice in 1992 under the supervision of Professor Marc Bossuyt and joined the BIPT in 1997. From 1999 to 2003, he held the position of expert at the private office of Rik Daems, who was the Federal Telecommunications Minister at the time, and afterwards he took up the function of Assistant Head of the Private Office. From 2003 to 2009, he was nominated as a Member of the BIPT Council for the first time. Following this mandate, he remained closely affiliated to the Council and supervised the legal department of the regulator during a number of years. He has written scientific publications. In 2013, he held a position on the Council as a Member. In January 2017, he was assigned Chairman of the BIPT Council

Dan Sjöblom BEREC Chair 2020 (PTS, Sweden)

Appointed by the Swedish Government, Dan Sjöblom has been the Director-General of the Swedish Post and Telecom Authority (PTS) since 1 February 2017.

He is the Chair of the Body of European Regulators for Electronic Communications (BEREC) for 2020. Prior to taking this position, Dan Sjöblom was the Director General of the Swedish Competition Authority from 2009 to 2017. He is also a board member of the Swedish Broadband Council. Dan Sjöblom performed various functions as a civil servant at the European Commission between 1996 and 2009.

He holds a Master of Laws from Stockholm University.

Annemarie Sipkes has held the position of Director of the Telecommunications, Transport and Postal Services Department at the Dutch Authority for Consumers and Markets (ACM) since April 2018. She has significant public sector experience, including six years [2012-2018] as the Director of Knowledge and Strategy at the Ministry of Education, Culture & Science in the Netherlands.

During her career, Annemarie Sipkes has also worked at the Ministry of Social Affairs and Employment, the Central Bank of the Netherlands and for KPMG, the accounting and professional services company.

Since August 2013, he has served as a non-executive director on the board of the United Kingdom's Competition and Markets Authority. He is co-editor (with Ariel Ezrachi) of the *Journal of Antitrust Enforcement*. From January 2006 to October 2011, Kovacic was a member of the US Federal Trade Commission, which he chaired from March 2008 to March 2009

William E. Kovacic was the FTC's General Counsel from June 2001 to 2004.



Matthew Newman

Chief correspondent, Europe MLex Matthew Newman is a chief correspondent for MLex and writes about data protection, privacy, telecoms, cyber security and artificial intelligence. Matthew Newman began his journalism career in 1991 in community newspapers. He worked as a reporter in Riga, Latvia in 1993 and then moved to Chicago where he covered local news. In 1995, he became a personal finance reporter for Dow Jones Newswires, and was then transferred to Brussels in 1999. He specialized in EU regulatory affairs, including trade and telecom issues. He began covering competition for Bloomberg News as an EU court reporter in 2004.

In 2010, Matthew Newman was named spokesman for Viviane Reding, the EU's justice commissioner. In January 2012, he helped launch the commission's proposal to overhaul the data protection rules. He began working at MLex in April 2012 and has covered mergers, antitrust and state-aid cases.

He spent a year studying French, history and communications in Grenoble, France in 1988 and 1989, and he is a graduate of Boston University with degrees in history and journalism. Matthew Newman earned a diploma in competition law from King's College in 2016.

Ursula Pachl is the Deputy Director General of BEUC, the European Consumer Organisation, representing 45 independent national consumer associations from 32 European countries.

As a rule, the task of the monitoring trustee is to control the implementation of commitments undertaken by companies under merger, antitrust or state aid proceedings on behalf of a domestic or European competition authority.

From 1996 to 2000, Luc Hindryckx was the Benelux Voice Support and Traffic Manager and then the Projects and Interconnection Manager of Global One. From 2000 to 2007, he held senior positions at Telenet, the largest provider of cable broadband services in Belgium. From 2008 to 2009, Luc Hindryckx set up his own company to provide executive leadership and strategic advisory services, and he completed assignments for Coditel/Numericable, KPN Belgium, IPM, WIN and TECTEO/VOO.
